1. Call to Order

Chair Winsome Rauch called the meeting to order at 7:09 PM. Quorum was met.

2. Dr. Shahana Alibhai: “Feel Better” – Role of Emotions in Mental Health

TEDx speaker, bestselling author, and family physician dedicated to improving emotional well-being. As Medical Director at **Foundry Abbotsford**—B.C.’s largest youth health centre and Bakerview Centre for Learning.

Foundry - youth services for ages 12-24. Medical doctor, lab work, social work, counselling, early psychosis prevention, START. 500-700 patients per month.

Adolescents don’t need more medications or things, they need education and unlearning of mental health. Goldilocks – if anything feels a little off, I need a dx, tx, or label for that. Is this stress manageable or unmanageable.

- When to intervene, when their mood impacts their sleep, sports, social and school.
- Understanding the role of emotional health – feel what you need to feel at the right time, learn how to regulate the emotions.
 - Seesaw 1 – feeling (arrow up) and regulation (down). Moms forget to feel, numb on auto pilot from years of serving others.
 - Regulation feels like – letting the snow flakes fall to the ground
 - What is the physical, mental, emotional cost of your regulation tools -often they come a friend and leave as an enemy
 - Seesaw 2 – Pain and pleasure. Cactus in a rain forest, we were never meant to have so much stimulation. The more pleasure, the more we need to increase pleasure to prevent any ounce of pain.
- Feeling – suppression, denial, blame others for our emotions. Works until it does not. Emotions are the great equalizer.

8. New business

Special guests at Meetings

President Winsome Rauch shared common practices from other DPACs and provided an update on the schedule for district leader attendance.

DPAC spoke with other DPACs (Maple ridge and Richmond) –

Maple Ridge: Trustees are invited to stay for the entire meeting but have the option to leave after their report. Often, they stay for the entire meeting to answer questions. They feel this has benefited relationships and it was helpful with asking direct questions.

Richmond: one or more trustee per meeting and district staff. Trustees often stay until the end of the meeting.

Both districts have guest speakers leave after their presentation.

Superintendent Ngieng will attend every other month this year to provide updates and answer questions related to the topics presented, and trustees will attend on a rotating basis.

Discussion summary:

Members wanted to know the benefit/purpose of trustees attending and requested clarification about what the board of education does and trustee roles. Member suggested viewing in the recorded board members meeting that are posted monthly to learn more about their roles and what they do. It was confirmed that the school act states they can come if they want. Concerns raised about members feeling uncomfortable speaking with authority members present. Benefits mentioned by other PACs are getting to know trustee members and being able to ask questions directly. Members requested more information about the role of the Board of Education and suggested that trustees provide a brief update at the beginning of each meeting.

Motion: That DPAC request a presentation from the Board of Education on the role of trustees including their responsibilities, committee involvement, and decision-making authority as well as clarification on what falls under the jurisdiction of the Board, the Province, and PACs.

Motion: That visiting trustees be asked to provide a brief introductory update at each DPAC meeting on the current work and priorities of the Board of Education.

Member questions to superintendent: Is there a budget for noon hour supervision and what is the allocation formula – admin/staff will step in a monitor, unfortunately, they are not able to fully step away from their roles to focus on supervision. Noon hour supervisors are not privy to information, training, or support that would support them in monitoring children consistently and safely.

Action: Noon-hour supervision concerns will be brought to superintendent for clarification.

Member question: who is responsible for crossing guards? Concerns about un guarded crossings and child safety.

Action: Question will be brought to superintendent for clarification.

10. Open floor

- Question: Is it a district rule that students who transfer schools cannot play sports for 1 year.

Answer: It is a BC School Sports rule that if you transfer schools, you cannot play a sport you have previously play for one year to prevent poaching. Possible solution is they may be able to practice but cannot compete. See BC School Sports Handbook - BC School Sports Rules and Student Transfer Exemptions for more information.
